# CLIMATE KICK START AWARD



The Mayor of London, Sadiq Khan, with the support of Bloomberg L.P, named Hammersmith Academy a winner of the Climate Kick Start Prize, alongside four other London secondary school winners.

The Climate Kick Start Prize were awarded to schools with pioneering environmental projects to engage young Londoners in climate action.

Prize winners were announced at a star-studded ceremony at the Barbican, hosted by the Mayor and TV presenter, Paralympian and climate activist, Ade Adepitan MBE. Each of the winning schools have been awarded £10,000 to kick-start or accelerate environmental action.

Hammersmith Academy was awarded the prize in order to develop the Outdoor Healthy Kitchen Project which will give students the chance to learn how to cook healthy meals using produce already grown in the Academy's garden. It will also encourage more fruit and vegetables to be grown.

The Mayor addressed students at the event about their role in tackling some of the planet's biggest threats - climate change, deforestation, biodiversity loss, air pollution and single-use plastics, as well as what governments and businesses need to do to help accelerate climate action.

The award coincided with the Youth and Public Empowerment Day of the UN Climate Change Conference in Glasgow (COP26) – giving London students the chance to make an impact during this important time of environmental action.

We are very much looking forward to the Outdoor Healthy Kitchen Project coming to life later in the academic year. This will be the third expansion of the garden space since the project began and will enrich the lives of our students and staff further still.

Congratulations to Ms Hodder and Mr Pillow and to all the students and staff who work so hard in making the garden such a wonderful resource.

### **NEW HOUSES**


THIS TERM THE ACADEMY INTRODUCED FIVE NEW HOUSES THAT REPRESENT A WIDER FIELD OF EXPERTISE AND BACKGROUNDS.











The academic year started with an exciting update to the Academy's House system with the introduction of new House figureheads and an expansion from four to five Houses.

The House System provides a healthy competitive spirit throughout the year amongst students across all aspects of student life. From sports days to charity bake sales, students vie to be the top performing House to accumulate points throughout the year. At the end of the year, the House with the most points wins the House Award.

When the Academy first opened a decade ago, students voted to have four representatives from the world of technology as the Academy House figureheads. Since then, the Academy has grown in both number of students and in areas of specialism. So in 2020, it was decided that the Houses needed updating to reflect the larger cohort and the diversity of the Academy.

During the 2021 summer term, the Junior Leadership Team began the process of putting together a long list of potential new representatives, all of whom are leaders in their fields and professions.

Students then presented to staff and governors, putting forward a case for each of the nominees and why they believe they should be chosen based on their achievements and contributions to society. From these presentations, the long list of nominees was reduced to a shortlist of 10 nominees.

After much deliberation, the final five were selected. We felt it important that these figures represent not only personal excellence but also the diversity of our own community. Our students felt it was also important to pay homage to the Academy's first cohort of students who were in the same position in the Academy's first year, by keeping Lovelace as a figurehead and therefore continuing their legacy.

A new purple colour was added alongside the existing four colours of red, blue, green and yellow and making up the five colours of the Houses.

At the start of this new academic year, students were all given new House ties and adjusted very quickly to the new system, getting fully competitive during the competitions and charity fundraising!

We will find out at the end of the academic year which House is crowned the winner of the House Shield. ■



Sixth Form students were offered a totally fabulous opportunity to attend the gala opening night of the BFI London Film Festival to see the World Premiere of The Harder They Fall in early October. As part of a long-standing relationship with the Black Ticket Project, an initiative dedicated to creating cultural access points for Black young people, a group of 12 received free tickets and joined a glamorous gala night audience on the red carpet at the Royal Festival Hall.

Inspired by the real-life stories of African-American cowboys and featuring an all-star cast, Jeymes Samuel's feature debut was an explosive and stylish Western. HA students enjoyed a pre-screening talk with the director, cast and crew, and subsequently met, not only the director, but also lead actors Idris Elba and Regina King, and London's Mayor Sadiq Khan.


It was an inspiring and uplifting evening with a diverse audience and a strong sense that the film industry is changing and that production careers should be open to all. The recent growth in demand for TV content has resulted in increased levels of investment in film and TV

# HOMEGROWN FRUIT JUICE

The Academy has been growing vegetables in the garden for a number of years. Each school day, students come down to tend to the crops; watering, weeding and feeding in all weathers and seasons.

Alongside vegetables, students have also planted fruit trees. Unlike the annual vegetables, fruit trees take several years to mature and bear fruit.

Student gardeners planted apple trees three years ago and this summer our apple trees produced a large enough crop to be harvested for the first time. This has been very rewarding for the young gardeners who have lovingly looked after the trees.

Ms Hodder, Environmental and Sustainability Lead said, "We thought it would be a lovely idea to use the apples in a way that can be enjoyed throughout the year. So we decided to take the harvest to a professional juicer who would produce our very own fruit juice! It just so happens that a local resident had harvested their own homegrown pears and donated some to be juiced alongside our apples."



One of the standout moments featured a letter written by a man who had been living in the tower for 5 years.

Set in a courtroom, the Grenfell Inquiry play shows the story of how the Grenfell fire affected the lives of those who lived in and around the tower.

The performance reflects the true story of their perspectives throughout the ongoing inquiry. With true facts and speeches that were spoken in the courtroom, the Grenfell Inquiry play helped gather understanding of how awful the situation was and still is for those who lived there.

From the show, not only have I come to better understand the ongoing inquiry, it also demonstrated how verbatim theatre is used. I learnt how writers can take real events and words spoken and recorded by journalists to create a shorter, yet still informative and engaging performance.

This production was not like the typical theatre show and was a great experience. The end-on staging and the lighting from above the seats made the inquiry feel even more real making the audience feel as if they were actually in the courtroom. They had multiple spotlights rigged to the ceiling and there were seats both

beside and in front of the stage.

When the play ended, It definitely wasn't what I expected however I quite liked the suspense and interesting story line. It was very interesting and not my typical preferred type of theatre show, but I would definitely go to see another piece of verbatim theatre if I ever get the next opportunity.

One of the standout moments featured a letter written by a man who had been living in the tower for 5 years. He had expressed his worry about the cladding, the sprinklers, and various different problems with the building. It showed that people were aware that this building was not safe for the residents living there.

The production showed us that there were many problems with safety in the building and how the residents' concerns were ignored.

The show inspired me in multiple ways and when it was over, I really wanted to one day try my own piece of verbatim theatre and maybe one day take on one of the roles of the actors on stage that day.

We look forward to using the manual in school and seeing more HA students, head down to the Makerspace workshops to put their STEM skills and creativity to the test.

communication, team working and leadership skills as well as fine tuning product design processes from the digital skill, using CAM and CAD, prototyping, development and marketing.

I found the programme really enjoyable as the staff were very supportive and made things easy to understand, we were given lots of freedom and were encouraged to make mistakes and learn from them. This meant that as a team we were able to understand each other better and create a really fun project.'

#### Mark Evison Foundation - STEM Projects

At the end of last year, Hammersmith Academy Sixth Formers were given the opportunity to apply for the Mark Evison Award, which gives young people the opportunity to develop their own challenging project.

The foundation invites young people to create and plan projects which are personally challenging. Such projects develop confidence, strength, resilience and breadth, as applicants take independent ownership of something they are keen to do.

Several students chose to apply and further their passion for STEM; working hard to complete highly professional designs. Here are the projects our Year 13 have been developing:

#### **Autonomous Car**

Year 13 students, Layla, Batoul, Khya, Matthew and Denis are developing an autonomous car. They said of the project, "Our main project idea was to create an autonomous car robot, that is a fully functioning car without the need for human intervention. Having a camera perched on the top of the car allows us to implement an algorithm that allows the car to follow a route as it moves: therefore, the car knows when to run the motors forwards, backwards, and stop the car accordingly. The steering of the car is controlled by a servo. As for

the physical structure, we created the body of the car entirely from scratch, using a laser cutter in the DT room.

We've learnt a lot whilst undertaking this challenging project. Being a computer science/engineering-based project, made us interested in exploring STEM careers, regardless of our previous knowledge, and introduced us to new concepts within physics and computer science. For example, using the Raspberry Pi computer for the first time, learning different inputs and outputs, dealing with voltage, and just overall applying, and expanding, on our knowledge from GCSE and A Levels.

The project also gave us an opportunity to experience the hardware and software that we'll be studying at university – giving us ideas of different areas we could research and discuss, hence giving us an excellent opportunity to create an outstanding university application."

#### Tropical Fish Tank

Anis in Year 13 was inspired by his previous GCSE DT project to create a fully operational tropical fish tank for the STEM project. He said of his Mark Evison Project, "After the application and interview was successful, I started working on the project with around two weeks left until the summer holiday and spent Monday-Friday in the DT Workshop creating online templates and designs, cutting and finishing the


wood and laser cutting the acrylic for the overall base and structure. I took all the parts home and then fabricated all the parts together. Not everything went to plan though, but I managed to overcome the setbacks and I soon had the final



structure assembled, glued, and finished together. After receiving the cut-to-size glass, I then joined the tank structure with silicone and did the required water tests as well as adding my own filtration system. Overall, the project was completed in three weeks. The whole process was a massive learning curve that allowed me to learn new methods and processes of manufacturing and above all showed me how much I could do when I persevered and worked hard to complete my project.'

In September, every Year 11 student took part in a 30 minute one-on-one careers interview with a trained career adviser from McDermott Educational Consulting.

The sessions took place using Microsoft Teams and helped students think about their next steps, both for when they finish Year 11 and for their longer-term futures.

While HA has always provided students with personal guidance, this was the first time, following a successful pilot last year, that an entire year group had the chance to experience an interview with a qualified careers adviser.

It would be understandable for any young person to feel unsure about their future career in the current climate. The news is full of stories about youth unemployment and the disproportionate impact of Covid-19 on young workers, who have been hardest hit by the pandemic in terms of job losses. There is also uncertainty over university places, with some institutions in financial difficulty and others struggling to keep up with demand over the next few years.

In this context, it is vital that young people get the best advice possible to make the career choices that are right for them. The advisers from McDermott Education were armed with information about labour market statistics, entry routes into different careers, universities, apprenticeships and traineeships and more, to answer the wide range of queries thrown at them by Year 11.

Rachel McDermott, head of McDermott Education, said: "the students were a joy to work with, there was such a variety of different career and study ambitions among them but they were all determined to work hard to achieve their goals. I have no doubt this year group will go far". One Year 11 student said that before the meeting she had: 'a very vague idea of what I wanted to do and the meeting helped me understand how to get there and gave me a clearer idea of what I wanted to do'.

After a highly successful week in which over 130 interviews took place, Year 11 can now concentrate on a challenging but exciting year ahead, with a better idea of what the future might bring.



## **NEXT STEPS EVENT**

PARENTS AND STUDENTS GOT THEIR CAREERS QUESTIONS ANSWERED BY A DIVERSE GROUP OF PANELLISTS.



While their focus remains on their immediate goal of preparing for their GCSE exams, our Year 11 students are also actively thinking about what comes next. After their one-on-one career interviews in September, the students and their parents were invited to attend the Year 11 Next Steps panel event on the evening of 10th November. The aim of the event was to present the students with a wide range of options to inform their plans for after they complete their GCSEs. While for many students contemplating the run-up to their exams this may seem like a long way off, all the panellists emphasised the importance of planning ahead to make the right decisions.

After introductions from their Student Achievement Manager Mr Fitchett and Head of Key Stage Ms Simonovski, the students settled in to listen to the panel. Chaired by Head of Careers Ms Harrowes, the panel included Ms Cutting, Deputy Head of HA Sixth Form, Mary Cunningham from the Department for Work and Pensions, Jo Swan from West

London College, Tyra Mills Female Engagement Coordinator at Chelsea FC and an ex-HA student, and Mustafa in Year 13 and Shehab in Year 12, both current students at HA Sixth Form.

Ms Cutting was able to provide the Year 11s with an insight into some of the differences between Year 11 and Sixth Form, explaining that while Sixth Form is still quite structured, students are expected to manage their own time effectively and become independent learners. Mary spoke about the apprenticeships route, highlighting that there are now very few roles that cannot be accessed through an apprenticeship. Jo talked about the differences between studying at college and sixth form, explaining the range of more vocational courses that West London College offer in areas including hairdressing, sport and construction. Tyra spoke about her journey after HA, which took her from a BTEC Sport course at college, to Arsenal FC, and finally to Chelsea and a place in a prestigious Nike

promotional campaign. Mustafa and Shehab both discussed their experiences at HA Sixth Form, with Mustafa revealing that he found putting his suit on in the morning got him in the mindset to learn which was important to him, while Shehab talked about the many different extra-curricular opportunities that he had already been able to access in his first term at Sixth Form. Each panellist brought their own fascinating perspective and gave our students and their parents a sense of the breadth of options available post-GCSEs.

The spirit of the evening was summed up by Ms Cutting, who advised the students not to lose sight of the exciting moment they were at in their lives, with many opportunities in front of them. With the Year 11s beginning their November mock exams the following week, the event provided a timely reminder to the students of what they were working towards and the rewards awaiting them for their hard work.

Hammersmith Academy works closely with local sporting outreach


organisations, including Queen's Park Rangers. One of their outreach aims is to get more young people involved in sport participation whether it is playing or watching.

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
