Hammersmith Academy is an inspiring and exciting place to learn. Our unrelenting focus on teaching and learning, combined with our state-of-the-art facilities, allows for students to make exceptional progress.

Our dynamic curriculum is traditional and rigorous; inspiring interest, developing skills and knowledge, and igniting our learners' passions. Our small class sizes allow greater interaction between students and teachers, and the extended day (8.30am–5pm) enables more time to be devoted to each subject area, encouraging deeper learning.

Key Stage 3 (KS3)

During Years 7, 8 and 9, students are taught all subjects of the National Curriculum:

- Art
- Design and Technology
- Drama
- English
- Spanish
- Humanities (History, Geography and Religious Studies)
- Computer Science
- Mathematics
- Music
- Physical Education
- SMSC (Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural Studies)
- · Triple Science

All subjects are allocated more time than the minimum national requirements. For the core of English, Mathematics and Science, students study 4 hours per week for each subject. Further, there is a particular focus on Sport (2.5 hours), Computer Science (1 hour 20 minutes), and the creative subjects of Music, Drama, Design Technology and Art (1 hour 20 minutes).



Key Stage 4 (KS4)

Students complete their GCSEs over two years from Years 10 to 11. We encourage students to follow the English Baccalaureate which provides a broad and balanced curriculum. In this programme of study, all students study a core curriculum of English, Mathematics, Triple Science, a Humanity (History or Geography), Spanish, Religious Studies and Computer Science and Creative Technology. In addition to the English Baccalaureate's core curriculum subjects, students are also given the option to study another two subjects of

Key Stage 5 (KS5)

Our Sixth Form is a springboard into Higher Education, employment or further training. Students can choose from a wide range of over 20 academic and vocational courses at A Level and BTEC, including the specialism of Computer Science.

All students play a key role in the Academy's peer coaching programme, providing the opportunity to develop leadership skills and mentor younger students to become confident learners.

Sixth Formers are expected to take a mature approach to their work and adopt a professional standard of dress, reflecting the ethos and ambitions of the Academy.

GCSE Results 2023

Hammersmith Academy celebrated outstanding GCSE results that exceeded national expectations and going against the trend of a downturn in top grades being awarded nationally.

Among the notable statistics, a staggering 78% of the grades awarded were at levels 9-4, significantly higher than the national average of 69%.

Moreover, 61% of Hammersmith Academy students achieved a strong pass in mathematics (grade 9-5). Equally impressive is the fact that 74% of students attained a strong pass in English (grade 9-5).

Impressively, 30% of all our grades awarded fell within the prestigious grade 9-7 range.

Our commitment to a well-rounded education is further highlighted by the fact that 73% of students were entered for the English Baccalaureate (EBacc) with 51% achieving the EBacc, both figures far above

the national average. This emphasis on a broad and balanced education ensures that students are not only academically accomplished but also equipped with a diverse skillset to excel in all aspects of life.

The English Baccalaureate is a qualification that measures students' achievement in English, mathematics, science, history or geography, and a modern foreign language.

The Academy's GCSE results demonstrates our commitment to fostering academic excellence, coupled with a holistic approach to education, continuing to shape the leaders and innovators of tomorrow.

- Accept responsibility for their actions.



Attendance

Our expectations of students are high in all areas and attendance is no exception. Excellent attendance is a vital part of our ethos and success. Developing the whole child

At HA we expect our students to show leadership right from the beginning. Years 7–11 can join the Junior Leadership Team (JLT) who meet regularly to develop various projects within the Academy and provide student feedback to the Headteacher. We want our students to be involved in the running of the school and have their voices heard.

Residentials

We develop students' skills both inside and outside of the classroom. Our aspirational environment is complemented by a comprehensive series of residentials and educational visits. These are an essential part of students' personal growth and development and a preparation for adult life.

Students in all year groups are given the opportunity to attend off-site adventure packed residentials both in the UK and abroad, participating in activities such as Orienteering, Abseiling, Canoeing and Raft making. Past residentials have included:

These skills have been shown to have a profound impact on the future success of individuals in both education and employment.

Students are also invited to take advantage of various educational visits to further develop their understanding in subject areas.

Session 3 Activities

Our extracurricular activities, known as Session 3, provide students with the opportunity to develop skills beyond those gained in daily timetabled academic lessons.

Students select from a wide range of clubs which take place after school, each with their own unique set of skill development, fostering personal interests and encouraging new experiences.

We expect all students to take part in at least one Session 3 Club each term.

More Able

At Hammersmith Academy we believe that all students should make excellent progress to achieve and fulfil their potential. We expect all students to become inquisitive. life-long learners that have high aspirations and ambitions however more able students will be expected to go beyond the curriculum and stretch their knowledge and understanding. Teachers will do this through their teaching and planning. Additionally, More Able (MA) students will be monitored to

ensure they are significantly challenged and make more than expected progress.
Further, MA students are encouraged to seek out Session 3 opportunities that will allow them to further apply learnt knowledge and skills in different contexts.

School and their partner schools.

Gardening and sustainability awards

All students take part in a gardening and sustainability programme. The Academy won the Climate Kick Start Award and also named Global Action Plan's Sustainable School of the Year.

Learners enjoy further opportunities through links with St Paul's School, St Paul's Girls' School, Lilian Baylis Technology School and the West London Partnership.

Numeracy and literacy

Numeracy and literacy needs are identified at an early stage so that we can tailor support programmes to individual needs. Students additionally receive specialist support including one-to-one mentoring, in-class support, subject-specific intervention and enrichment activities.

The Academy complies with the Special Education Needs (SEND) Code of Practice and, as far as reasonably practical; those with physical and learning disabilities will be offered maximum access to the curriculum.





HArts

The HArts Department is one of the shining beacons at Hammersmith Academy. Our enthusiastic support of the Arts has developed close links with both local and national arts organisations.

These partnerships have seen students work alongside the Royal College of Music, the London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art, the Donmar Warehouse and the Lyndon Arts Trust, as well as visiting the Lyric, Bush and other London theatres.

Students have had their work shown at the Saatchi and Tate Galleries and our Art Department has close ties with Hayward Gallery and Design Museum, which includes a special Design Museum Takeover Weekend just for the HA community.


We are very proud of our students' achievements in the Arts. The Arts present an opportunity for all students to express their creativity and individuality, whilst broadening their horizons. HArts, a

collaboration between our Technical and Performing Arts departments, extend these benefits through a number of additional activities throughout the year.

In the last academic year we produced a staggering number of performances, collaborations and exhibitions showcasing everything from fine art to drama to ballet. We also welcomed industry professionals to provide insight into the creative art industry, including TV and screen actor, Finn Cole.

We have had standout productions of Bugsy Malone, Sister Act and In The Heights, all aspects of the shows, including set design, lighting and choreography, taken on by our students.

Students gain a unique insight into the working world of the Arts through the Academy's specialist facilities which includes an industry standard theatre, production and editing suites, a drama studio with full lighting rig, and Art and Design studios complete with laser cutter, CAD router and kiln room. At Hammersmith Academy, students get a truly well-rounded experience when it comes to the Arts.











The Academy's specialisms of Computer Science and Creative & Digital Media are infused through all subjects and enhance the traditional curriculum to better prepare our students for the digital world.

Maths

HA Maths prove themselves every year with the. Count on Us Secondary Maths Challenge, a unique, inter-school maths programme for Year 7, 8 and 9 students across London. In the last academic year, students qualified for the Grand Final held at City Hall.

Science

All our Science teachers are specialists in either Physics, Biology or Chemistry. Science takes up an entire floor within the HA building with state-of-the-art equipment. We also have a science garden, tended by students and teachers, and a terrace for summer revision activities. We go on regular trips to science centres such as the Royal Observatory; Kew Gardens; The Wellcome Trust and the London Transport Museum. HA also regularly perform live web chats with real scientists, giving the students the chance to pose questions and see science in action.

Computer Science

We are equipped with top of the range facilities including high-grade computing suites (PC and Mac), laptops, tablets, multi-media packages (cameras and flipcams) and Radio, Music and Video editing suites. Raspberry Pi (the new credit-card-sized computer developed to promote teaching computer science) and LEGO Mindstorms have also been integrated within our ICT curriculum.

Technology

The DT workshop is fully equipped with a 3D printer, laser cutter, pewter caster, CADCAM, Photoshop; everything a professional design technologist needs. Our ICT classrooms come equipped with Apple iMac suites and all learning bases throughout the school are ICT equipped with interactive whiteboards.

The Academy has an outstanding record of Arkwright Engineering Scholarships awarded with 3 students receiving the most esteemed engineering scholarship in the UK.

Sport

Students are encouraged to participate in a range of competitive sports against their peers and other schools. Sport and Physical Education play an important role in the development of students' individual teamwork and leadership skills.

All students enjoy a minimum of 2.5 hours per week of PE (higher than the National Curriculum's minimum). During lessons and after-school Session 3, students also have access to the Fitness Suite, providing them with the opportunity to improve their fitness, through using top of the range aerobic exercise and resistance training equipment.

We also have access to King's House Sports Ground, for extended off-site games use, and the Fulham Reach Boat Club, so that we can offer rowing as part of our curriculum - unusual for an inner-city school.

Sporting Achievements

- KS3/KS4 competed in the Borough Basketball Championships qualifying for the London Youth Games Final.
- Students qualified to represent borough athletics team after finishing in the top two competitors.
- One student went on to represent London in the National Athletics final and won a Silver medal at the competition.
- Year 11 won the QPR League Championship & Year 10 won the QPR

- League Plate.
- Students competed in the Junior NBA League.
- The HA Boat Club competed in their first official regatta and one crew won their first race for the boat club in the Putney Town regatta.
- One student came second in the borough indoor rowing competition resulting in her competing in a trans-Atlantic virtual race against students from New York.

Shoes

Plain black leather shoes are an essential part of the Academy uniform. These must be closed toe and not made of canvas or suede. Shoes must be plain and with no branding. Lace up shoes are permitted, boots are not.

Hair and Jewellery

No jewellery is to be worn except plain watches and one plain metal, discreet ear stud in each ear. We do not allow any visible piercings (including nose piercings) except ear studs. Hair must be worn in a style appropriate to a business environment (plaited or in a ponytail if long). Extreme hairstyles/colours and hair bands that undermine the expectations of the Academy will not be permitted. No make-up or nail polish is permitted except for Sixth Formers. Headscarves and hijabs must be plain black or grey.

Food

At Hammersmith Academy we believe that a well-balanced, nutritional diet is hugely important for our students' learning and development.

We work closely with our specialist caterers, Olive Dining, to provide students with high quality breakfasts and lunches that are cooked daily in our kitchen, catering for all dietary requirements and ensuring students are ready and prepared for the day's lessons.

Fresh fruit is available at lunch and break time. As part of our commitment to healthy eating, we do not have high sugary snacks or fizzy drinks available on site.

The cafeteria space sees students and staff seated together providing continued contact time, helping to build important relationships and providing an important sense of community.

Admissions

The Academy is part of the pan-London admissions scheme which requires all parents to complete a preference form. In doing so, Hammersmith Academy must be listed as one of your preferences on the Local Authority form.

The school will admit 140 pupils into Year 7 every September (in accordance with the Academy's published admission number). Preference will be given to students living in the Admissions Priority Area (APA).

Those who are offered a place at Hammersmith Academy will be informed in March through the Local Authority.

Fair banding

Every applicant to the Academy will be required to take a fair banding test, this includes looked after children.

Children with an EHCP are not required to sit the fairbanding test.

Every applicant will be placed in one of five bands based on their performance in the test. This does not affect their eligibility for selection. An equal number of students are admitted from each band. Places will be allocated by applying the oversubscription criteria.
