## TRIPS & ACTIVITIES

### OUTWARD BOUND WALES





The Outward Bound Trust was established in 1941 and is the original provider of outdoor education. Their mission is to unlock the potential in young people through discovery and adventure in the wild.

Eighty students from Year 9 and Year 10 travelled to Aberdovey in Wales in February to experience life away from the city and discover more of themselves and their abilities.

Students wasted no time in getting stuck in. After acquainting themselves with their accommodation, they made their way to the beach for the first of their activities, followed by an evening of team building exercises.

The following morning, students split into their teams for the week with challenges devised by the group leaders. These included Jacob's

Ladder and aerial course, which required teammates to work together to reach the summit. No easy task with each rung getting increasingly wider.

Another team activity saw teams having to build a seaworthy vessel. Students had to work together using logs, barrels and rope to construct the vessel, before launching it into the ocean with students paddling on board. The winner was the team that travelled the furthest and stayed afloat the longest!

Rock climbing and abseiling were also on the week's agenda. Students had to overcome the natural fear of heights as they ascended the rock face. Once at the top, students took in the incredible view of the Welsh countryside.

One of the hardest challenges was the expedition, requiring students to plan their hiking route and prepare their camping equipment for an overnight stay in the wilderness, leaving behind their creature comforts. Despite this, students THE OUTWARD

### **OUTWARD BOUND** LAKE DISTRICT

Twelve Year 8 students travelled to Ullswaster in the Lake District to take part in an Outward Bound programme. The aim of the trip was to raise aspirations, connect with nature, develop curiosity and the desire to aim higher and think bigger. We wanted students to seek out new opportunities and develop skills to

opportunities and develop skills to cope with setbacks. These are key skills required for success in their education and employment.

Before every activity there was a skill-based discussion with the trip leader. Students were able to discuss how each of the activities linked back to the Academy's ethos and character development.

One of the activities was camping which required students to prepare for a day long trek and an overnight camping session. Students had to show responsibility for preparing and packing their own equipment and clothing, as well as pitching their clothing, as well as pitching their own tent and cooking equipment. Students also had to cope with weather conditions which they were

not accustomed to. Since returning from the trip, students have an added appreciation for being organised and prepared for school, which is less challenging in comparison.

Addy said, "I really enjoyed the Outward Bound trip especially the activities. Camping was challenging as we had to do everything ourselves."

### Tate Modern Visit

On Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> March, 44 Year 10 students had the privilege of visiting Tate Modern on South Bank. Tate Modern is one of the most prominent contemporary art galleries in the world, and the trip was planned to support students working on their upcoming GCSE Art Portraiture project.

The students were excited to visit the museum, and for many, it was their first time visiting the Tate Modern. Alyesha was impressed by the variety of art on display. She said, "It was amazing to get to see so many different artists from a range of movements in one place. I found each room really interesting and left feeling inspired!"

During the trip, our Year 10s had the opportunity to participate in a range of different workshops which built on their experimental, as well as observational drawing skills. The workshops were designed to provide the students with an opportunity to directly respond to the artwork on display in the gallery.

Students were impressed by the vastness of the collection, which included works by famous artists like Barbara Kruger, whose work is being used as inspiration for

their portraiture project. Frida said, "Kruger's use of text and images was really interesting. I can see how her style could be used to create a powerful portrait."

The trip to the Tate Modern was an excellent opportunity for Year 10 students to broaden their artistic horizons and gain inspiration for their upcoming projects. The students left the gallery feeling motivated and excited to apply what they had learned in their own works of art. As Carlos put it, "There's something really special about Tate Modern. On the back of this success, this year 30 Year 10 students have signed up to the DofE Bronze... The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme challenges young people to push themselves in a variety of ways to learn new skills, improve physical activity and volunteering.

Last year, 28 Year 10 students took part in the DofE Bronze Level. Participants spent 12 months learning new skills which culminated in a summer expedition to Bentley Copse in Guildford. Students were assessed by official assessors and had to demonstrate planning, independence and teamwork.

To prepare for this assessment, students had several planning sessions which included navigation and route planning, map reading, equipment and kit preparation, before going on a practice expedition in East Grinstead.

Congratulations to all the students who took part and successfully completed their Bronze Award. We are so proud of their achievements and dedication towards the programme throughout Year 10.

On the back of this success, 30 Year 10 students have signed up to the DofE Bronze this year. They have undergone and completed training for Countryside Code, First Aid, Expedition Aims and they are now working towards their Volunteering, Skill and Physical sections of the award independently.

NINE EXTRAORDINARY SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDENTS HAVE BEEN AWARDED A PRESTIGIOUS MAYOR'S COLDSTREAM GUARDS PRIZE.



The annual Mayor's Coldstream Guards Prize is championed by the Mayor of Hammersmith & Fulham and awarded in partnership with 17 Company, The Coldstream Guards, one of the borough's main Army Reserve Units.

Hammersmith Academy held its first ever chess tournament in February having built up a large number of regular attendees to the Chess Session 3 Club.

The tournament attracted over 40 participants in a thrilling competition held in the Academy's Theatre. For many of the competitors, this was the first time they had experienced competition conditions, including the use of a chess clock which keeps track of the remaining time a player has in a game of chess and displays the time for each player separately.

Competitors keenly showed off their mastery of the game, demonstrating their individual strategies and tactics.

Two students stood out in particular against some very stiff competition. Pau in Key Stage 3 and Emir in Key Stage 5 collected the most points over five rounds of play.

The competition was closely competitive, Anas and Leandro in Key Stage 4, and Hussein and James in Key Stage 3 deserve a special mention as they missed out on first place by just a single point.

Overall, the tournament was a fantastic success, showcasing the strategic thinking and intellectual capacity of the students.

We will be looking to expand the number of competitive matches and students taking part in chess, so if any students missed the chance to compete, there will be other opportunities very soon!

### BATTLE OF THE BANDS

THE WEST LONDON PARTNERSHIP BATTLE OF THE BANDS SAW YOUNG MUSICAL TALENT COMPETE TO BE CROWNED TOP BAND. MS HARROWES, REPORTS FROM THE CONCERT.



A night of creativity, collaboration, high expectations and extraordinarily diverse performances lifted the roof at Hammersmith Academy earlier this term. Bands from seven of the West London Partnership's 11 schools hit the stage for an audience of friends and family, performing one song each in front of a panel of four industry judges. Cardinal Vaughan's band Teratoma were crowned champions, performing a cover of Kings of Leon's Use Somebody, with Wimbledon High's Neptune in second place and our very own Double Dudes stepping up to collect third.

The West London Partnership is a coalition of 11 local schools from both the private and state sector that work together to share expertise, facilities and resources to benefit

the students. A student committee meets regularly to develop ideas for collaboration and this was the first student led WLP event to get off the ground. Charity and community are central themes to the partnership, so proceeds from the event will be donated to the Felix Project, a foodbank charity the Academy has worked with since 2020. Ticket prices were kept deliberately low, but even so the evening raised more than £200.

On the night of the show there was a real air of excitement. Whilst the bands waited in the green room for their time on stage, the three student comperes from St Paul's School, Putney Girls' School and Year 12 Hammersmith Academy student Mariam kicked off the



### Pilot Academy Kitchen

The Academy has joined with Leith's Cookery School this year to bring the essential life skill of cooking to students. HA is part of their national pilot for the brand new, 'Leiths' Academy Kitchen'.

Year 8, 9 and 10 participants were selected to join the new Session 3 Club based on a creative application process. While some of the programme involves cooking sophisticated meals at home; the students have worked closely with Ms Wan and Ms Ferrell to come up with the ideas and source equipment to bring cooking to HA.

In the first cooking session, students got creative with pancake recipes. Nikita in Year 9 said, "I enjoyed learning how to make food, working as a team with my friends and learning new skills. I found it to be a wonderful experience and am more independent."

Stefan in Year 9 added, "We were able to independently test things out which meant that we could learn from our own mistakes and improve each





time we tried again. I would love to see more opportunities for us to cook at school."

### Imperial College London: I-Explore

### **MATHS IN ACTION**

A lawyer named, Claudia inspired us with her passion of tackling the illegal use of technology the significance of her job... Twenty Year 10 students were invited to Weil, Gotshal & Manges - one of the world's largest law firms to explore and discover practical maths and finance in action. The aim of the visit was to show what maths means in the everyday world of work and talk to professionals about how to access jobs in their career sector.

We visited their offices in Chancery Lane which was very modern and had a great view overlooking London. On arrival, we were greeted at reception and took the lift to the 8<sup>th</sup> floor. They had set up one of their big office spaces for us, with pens and notepads for us to take notes during the event; as well as lunch, drinks and snacks.

Tobias looked after us while we were there and started the session off by telling us about the law firm and the industry in general. The diversity in careers and jobs roles is surprising and this trip was eye-opening and a great opportunity to figure out more things to do in any industry not just in law.

We had a networking session with lawyers, where we gained valuable insight from across all positions in the company. It was an exciting

opportunity to meet new and interesting people. Learning about their back-stories and their place of work gave us an insight into the world of law. Before speaking to the volunteers we thought law was just about court cases and arguing, after speaking to them we learnt about all different areas of law, such as technology, banking and family cases. A lawyer named Claudia inspired us with her passion of tackling the illegal use of technology and the significance of her job and mentioned well-known celebrities that she had previously worked with.

We played a board game in small groups called Road to Riches, which is all about making financial decisions. It was interesting having conversations with lawyers about the game as they were able to give us insight about the world and finances.

We all thoroughly enjoyed the experience. Weil, Gotshal & Manges is an amazing law firm with great employees. We learnt a lot and it was a privilege to have the experience. We learned a lot of new things that we did not know before. A big thank you to Weil, Gotshal & Manges and Mayor's Fund for London for giving us this opportunity.

### **CAREERS FOCUS**

THIS TERM, THE CAREERS DEPARTMENT HAS BEEN INCREDIBLY BUSY, COORDINATING A WIDE RANGE OF FANTASTIC OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS ACROSS THE YEAR GROUPS.



### **STEM**

Promoting STEM Careers is always an important part of our careers programme. This term, we started off in January by welcoming a brilliant speaker, Dr Neil Uphadyay, Consultant Radiologist at Charing Cross and St Mary's Hospital, who addressed Year 12 Biology students. This talk was arranged as part of Imperial College London's Medic Mentor Programme, which links practising doctors who teach at Imperial with local schools. Dr Uphadyay shared fascinating insights into his work, including the reality of challenges such as long hours and excessive workload in the profession.

Later in the term, Year 10 and Year 12 students heard from first- and second-year UCL medical students, as part of the UCL Next Top Doctor programme, which introduced students to the medical application process and what studying medicine is really like.

Meanwhile, in March, 60 Year 8 students were selected to take part in a HS2 engineering workshop.



As well as introducing students to some of the exciting STEM careers they could consider when they leave school, the students also got to find out about specific roles that might be available for them at HS2. During the workshop, students got very hands-on, working in teams of four to first design a floorplan for a 'station for the future', featuring sustainable energy, accessible spaces and futuristic amenities, then to build a 'tunnel' out of 40 paper straws that had to withstand a kilogram weight. Each task allowed students to develop key skills, such as teamwork, problem-solving and leadership, that will stand them in good stead in their future careers.

### Universities

Working with top universities through the HA careers programme is not just about STEM subjects. In February, a group of Year 10 students attended a session run by the London Interdisciplinary School. During the session, students were set a wide-ranging global problem and encouraged to use interdisciplinary, lateral thinking to problem solve.

Our Oxbridge programme for high achieving Year 12 students has started in earnest, with a February information session from Fitzwilliam College Cambridge, followed by a trip to Oxford University's Pembroke College in March. Students who aspire to apply for these highly selective universities are encouraged to begin super-curricular research now to strengthen their applications.

In Key Stage 3, 30 Year 8 students went out on a trip to Brunel University, organised alongside our partner organisation IntoUniversity. The students had a brilliant time, with activities including campus tours by current students and taster sessions.

### **Apprenticeships**

Apprenticeships offer excellent alternative routes for students and increasingly our Year 13s appreciate







that the challenges and rewards are equal to university, and avoid the need to take out a student loan. This term we introduced our students to several apprenticeship providers. First, we hosted an apprenticeships insight event run by Sky TV, during which Year 13 students heard about the exciting roles available at Sky, including in Development Operations, Cyber Security and Marketing. Our students took part in a series of

exercises designed to replicate the assessment day group activities that Sky use to select their candidates.

Year 13s were given the opportunity to sign up for a trip to the head office of BlackRock, the world's largest asset management company. BlackRock are recruiting for a number of top apprenticeship roles within their business that have been set aside for HA and a small number of pilot schools. Students are now

waiting anxiously to hear if they are through to the next stage.

### **National Careers Week**

If all this wasn't enough, we celebrated National Careers Week, with a round of assemblies and newsletters sent to students. Our assembly focused on why careers education is such an important part of what we do as a school, as well as encouraging them to take the opportunities available to them at HA. These include Unifrog, our awardwinning careers platform that all students, from Year 7 to Year 13, are signed up to. Parents are also able to access this valuable resource to find out more about university courses, apprenticeships and how to make excellent applications; please get in touch if you'd like us to send you the parent sign up code.

Finally, our careers programme benefits hugely from collaborations with local businesses. If you, or someone you know, would like to be involved in any way, please get in touch!

### QPR DRAGON'S DEN

This term, students in Year 8 have been receiving weekly mentoring sessions with Queen's Park Rangers (QPR) as part of the Premier League Inspires programme.

One of the projects requires students to devise a social action project to pitch to representatives including guests from 'Imagine 2030' - a climate change organisation from Hammersmith & Fulham and QPR players in the style of Dragons' Den.

Hammersmith Academy's team came up with the idea of 'Wallet Saves', recycling old goalkeeper's gloves into wallets and card holders. The judges were so impressed by the concept and the pitch that they selected HA as the winners.

One of Dragons, David Wilkins from Imagine 2030 who was keen to praise the participants' ideas, "It was interesting to see the process of how the young people thought of their ideas around making better use of



resources that we currently have.

We really liked the winning project as it ticks a lot of boxes. We didn't realise that goalkeepers use so many gloves, so it's great to see that they were utilising products that footballers normally throw away. We liked the sustainability side of it.

It was also interesting to find out that goalkeeper gloves are often branded, so it definitely adds value that fans of the football club will be interested in buying."

### **GINA MILLER VISITS**



On the anniversary of Brexit itself, Gina Miller, the face of citizens standing up to Government, came to the Academy to speak to A Level Politics students about her personal journey into law and politics and the workings of the UK's political system.

Ms Miller is famous for her Supreme Court cases where she successfully challenged the powers of the Prime Minister and defended Parliament on two occasions. The first when the then Prime Minister, Theresa May tried to begin the Brexit process without a vote by Parliament and again when her predecessor, Boris Johnson prorogued Parliament (kept it closed).

Her talk was informative and enlightening as it not only contributed to the current debates and discussions we are having in class but also topics beyond that. It was particularly interesting to discuss current political issues with someone actively trying to change the rigid political system by starting her own political party - the True and Fair Party.

We asked for her thoughts on an elected House of Lords - a current

ongoing debate in parliament. We also discussed what reforms she would introduce to create a healthier democracy such as reforming the current electoral system. She spoke passionately about her desire to ensure the government can be held accountable efficiently. She emphasised the importance of an independent Supreme Court as she explained how the Supreme Court had upheld democracy on multiple occasions. On the other hand, we were also able to challenge her beliefs too. For example, how she believed her party would form a government, discussing the current political dilemma of a 'two-party' voting system.


She also discussed the hurdles and attacks she has faced in her political career such as racism and sexism. To hear how she is still advocating for what she believes despite the challenges was motivating and insightful. Her final advice for us, the younger generation, was to make sure we are politically aware and encouraged us to start voting as soon as we can as it is our future that is impacted by present-day politics.

### **VOTING BREAKFAST**



Political concepts can be difficult to see in action from textbooks alone. To help students understand the difference between two different voting systems; First Past the Post and Proportional Representation, Head of History and Politics, Mr

Glavanis, put on a special breakfast demonstration!

If Party A wins 4 votes, Party B wins 3 & Party C wins 3, under First Past the Post, Party A wins. Those who voted for Party B and C are not represented.

An alternative to First Past the Post is Proportional Representation where Parliament is made up proportionally. So Party A has 40% of the seats and Party B and C has 30% each.

The Year 13s had a demonstration of these electoral systems using breakfast cereal. Students had to decide whether they wanted a First Past the Post Coco Pops, even though they didn't choose Coco Pops, or a Proportional Representation mix of Coco Pops with Rice Krispies with Frosties, even though they may not want the other two cereals.

Students were quick to comment on their preferences and the pros and cons of each of the systems. The demonstration brought to life what students have been studying during their lessons, giving them a better understanding of the electoral principles.

### PARLIAMENT TRIP

Year 12 and 13 Politics students ventured to the heart of our democracy with a visit to the Houses of Parliament.

While we were meant to have workshops, strikes meant we were given tours instead and in truth lucked out.

Our students have been through the Kings entrance in parliament where in a few months time King Charles will walk. It isn't open to the public but was for us that day. Sheer opulence, decoration and history oozed from every corner.

Our guides led us through the House of Commons and Lords, the Royal rooms and the famous Lobby.

We saw amazing sights including the panels depicting Henry VIII and his wives. His children including Elizabeth I were shown, as well as England's famous victory over the



Spanish Armada. Quite a unique experience!

Year 13 were also treated to a walking tour of Whitehall where they took in protests, Downing Street and

Westminster Square.


