On-Task behaviour

I know that my phone should remain switched off at all times and I should go to reception if I need to call my parents/careers.

No answering back

I understand that my teachers and others adults in the academy are there because they care for me and because they are experts in their field. I will not be rude or answer them back disrespectfully. I will follow their instructions first time, every time.

Perfect uniform

Resourceful


I can capitalise on the resources available to me

Parent Top Tip: As students will hear this language in school, you can also use the language at home to help students make the connection between how these life skills apply in the world, and to everyday challenges.

HA PRIDE

Within our Hammersmith Academy Values it is important that we are preparing ourselves for a global society.

We are all active citizens, and in order to do this here at the Academy we follow a moral code that we call PRIDE.

We are encouraged to be independent active citizens. We are encouraged to take the responsibility in our academy and within our community by standing up for what we know is right. 'Do the right thing because it is the right thing to do.'

We are encouraged to make choices and do this by showing respect and understanding of others. We learn how to exercise our rights and act responsibly, in a safe and healthy way.



DEMOCRACY

Parent Top Tip: It is important that we are raising young people to be citizens of the world; use the PRIDE structure to engage your child in conversations about wider social issues; this will help them to make connections between being a good moral and active citizen both inside and outside the Academy.

SILENT READING

If there is one skill that you should master, it is reading. Reading is so important for you because you need to use reading to learn all your subjects. Without strong reading skills, you may struggle in Maths, Science, Humanities and the Arts. As adults, you will read every day no matter what type of job you have.

To maintain your reading age you should be acquiring 40 pieces of new vocab. In order for students to access the new GCSE specifications they are required to read at the minimum age of a 15 year old.

WHY?

- To improve your reading skills for all subjects
- To allow you to read a variety of books
- To allow you to share your reading with others





Parent Top Tip: The best way to support students in engaging with reading is to model reading at home – can you introduce a 20 minute reading time in the week at home, in which members of the family all read together? Reading recreationally can help students to develop their vocabulary, and improve their extended writing – crucial skills for all students.




HOME LEARNING & PRESENTATION OF WORK

Causes of Uneven Development.

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Presentation of work:

Student workbooks are a child's best learning and revision resource. That is why we place such an importance of the presentation of work at the academy.

Students are expected to take pride in their work and ensure they are presenting it in an appropriate way – clear titles and dates underlined

Students will be given time in lessons to redraft their work in green pen in order to move their work forward, and respond to teacher feedback – this is an important part of making progress



Parent Top Tip: Take time to look at your child's workbooks with them – are they taking pride in their work and presenting it appropriately? Are there any targets you can set together to improve on the quality of work; or praise you can give to celebrate high quality presentation? Students respond well to having input from multiple adults on the quality of their learning.

Home Learning:

One of the biggest changes students and parents will experience in Year 7 is online learning.

Home learning will be an important part of developing independent learning skills – an important skill for developing good exam and revision practices.

All home learning is set on the Satchel One app – parents and students are able to see the work set as well as teacher deadlines and submissions.

In the Autumn term, all year 7 students will receive a chromebook provided by the Academy. This is to support your child and their learning and we want to make sure that all students, no-matter their backgrounds, have equal access to the resources they need.

Suggested level of donation is £20 per term over a three year period.

A good homework routine is crucial from the get go!



Parent Top Tips:

- Use the Satchel One app regularly to check on your child's progress with home learning; make sure you check the time the teacher has allocated to the task
- Allocate a suitable space for students to complete their home learning in the home – is it free from distractions? Is their space for students to lay out the equipment and resources they need? Is it away from noise?
- Consider removing distractions from your child when it is home learning time such as mobile phones
- Check the quality of work with your child have they taken the same time, care and effort with presentation as you would expect with their workbooks?

SUMMER HOMEWORK PROJECT PARENT RESOURCES

English Department – Summer Task

Parents,

As part of our transition process we would like your child to complete the following task in order to support in their progress and development between primary and secondary school.

Pupils have the materials necessary to support them in this task but please find an overview of the task we, as an English department, would like your child to complete during the summer break:

Creative Writing

- The protagonist of 'The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas' is Bruno: an inquisitive, curious and adventurous young man.
- Pupils have been tasked with writing a short descriptive story about someone who is about to embark on a challenging or exciting experience.

They have been provided the following options but may create their own perspective if they so wish:

- 1. A scientist on the brink of a cure for cancer.
- 2. An explorer who is close to finding an uncharted city.
- 3. A pupil beginning a new school.
- 4. A sportsperson on the night before the final of a championship.

The success criteria has been included in the pupils' resources but is repeated here for your information:

- 200-300 words
- Descriptive and engaging
- Involved some of the five senses
- Is spelled and punctuated accurately with a variety of vocabulary and sentence structures

Maths Department- Summer Task

Task 1: Four questions for us to see how students carry out calculations. Please make sure full working out is shown.

Task 2: This is an opportunity for students to tell their teacher how they feel about different aspects of maths- it can be as vague as "numbers" and "shapes"; or specific, such as "adding improper fractions" and "long multiplication".

Task 3: A slightly longer task to get students thinking- they do not need to complete all of the boxes (we will be very impressed if anyone comes to school with them all filled in!). Students should be familiar with the first few operations listed (multiplication, division, addition, subtraction and brackets) and can focus on only using them.
