Sixth Form students embarked on an international trip to Switzerland to visit CERN, a leading scientific institution and to take in Swiss history and culture as well as explore the stunning architecture and landscape.

cohort with a prom on the Thames. For them, it is a time of transition into a new phase of study or work and apprenticeships.

OUTDOOR KITCHEN CLASSROOM OPENS!



In July the Academy formally launched the new Outdoor Kitchen Classroom, a unique transformative space that will allow our students to learn about food and sustainability in a hands-on way, surrounded by the very ingredients they are growing!

Food education is essential to all our futures, so by learning the fundamentals of cooking and how food is produced and transported, students will be better prepared to make informed lifelong choices about their own health and that of the planet's.

This new teaching space adds another strand to the Academy's extracurricular provision which already includes gardening and sustainability projects.

The project was funded by the Mayor's Fund as a result of the Academy winning the Mayor of London's Climate Kick Start Award back in November 2021.

EXPEDITION SEASON



DUKE OF EDINBURGH COORDINATOR, MR FITCHETT REPORTS ON A SUCCESSFUL EXPEDITION SEASON.

They have all risen to the challenge incredibly well and we are really proud of their achievements.

The undoubted highlight of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award is the expedition. While students gain skills of map reading and navigation, perhaps more important are the challenges of leadership, self-reliance and teamwork that are required.

Earlier this term DofE students headed into Richmond Park for their practice walk, a one-day expedition walking around 7km. For some students this was their first experience of walking in the countryside - valuable experience of stepping outside their comfort zones with the support of staff. They also developed their camp craft skills and final preparations for their final expedition.

The final assessed expedition saw them travelling to and from Bentley Copse in Dorking, walking 25 km over two days, pitching their own tents and navigating their routes around rural Surrey.

Students met all the twenty assessment criteria and it was a pleasure to see how positive, dynamic and capable they all were. They had to deal with a mixture of unfamiliar woodland trails and public footpaths across farmland. Students showed incredible first aids skills too when they had to support a member of the public who needed medical attention!

The experiences involved in the award are new to many of our students, and they have all risen to the occasion incredibly well and we are proud of their achievements. Thank you to all of the staff and parents who have supported the students through their efforts.

A SWISS EXPERIENCE

SIXTH FORM STUDENTS TRAVELLED TO GENEVA, SWITZERLAND TO VISIT THE EUROPEAN ORGANISATION FOR NUCLEAR RESEARCH (CERN) AND TAKE IN THE CULTURE. OUR TRAVELLERS TELL US MORE.

In our first overseas trip since the pandemic, Year 12 students travelled to Switzerland for a very special visit to the European Organisation for Scientific Research (CERN) to see the Large Hardon Collider, the world's largest and highest-energy particle collider.

For the physics students among the group, this is a site of special importance where theory becomes reality. Students were given an exclusive tour of the collider and spaces where scientists work daily.

During the remainder of their time, students discovered Swiss fondue and took in the famous sights of the country including the Alps and a lake tour. Whilst in Geneva they also made the most of a music and art week taking place in public spaces.

Naeem said of the trip, "It will definitely be one to remember for a very long time. Going to CERN expanded my knowledge further on the use of particle physics in the real world. I wish we stayed there longer



and can't wait to relive everything in an upcoming vlog!"

Esugen added, "The trip was the perfect place to connect with friends and teachers on a deeper level.

I learnt that CERN found discovered ways to bind different branches of sciences together, quantum physics to computer science, and computer science to chemistry. Seeing learnt material in school made me think that it is not all a useless quadratic formula, but the building blocks to unveiling the universe as seen in CERN's particle accelerator, by which the process is by far the most mind-blowing experience I've had. Highly recommend, great pricing too."

Elwad finished by saying, "Geneva was a very beautiful city and visiting CERN was amazing. The interactive presentations were amazing and I was interested in every detail.

THEATRE IN A BOX



The Theatre Box Workshop is a year-long programme that introduces Year 7 students to the world of theatre production. Students learn about costume design, sound and lighting, and acting by working with professionals to develop their skills

and create their own show based on A Dummy's Guide to Being Lost by playwright, Ed Harris.

Students were placed into different teams each overseeing individual elements of the show. For example. the lighting team devised and

programmed lighting sequences that best fit the performance and the costume team created visually impactful characters.

Over the course of the workshops, students have been working towards a performance to deliver to teachers and the playwright himself.

The performance showcased their collective efforts and demonstrated just how much they have learned during the process. The presence of the writer added a special touch, and students gained valuable insights during their Q&A with him. They asked what inspired him to write the play and the characters he created.

The students said, "We loved the workshop. It was fun working together as a team to put on a theatre show. We all learned new skills that we didn't know we could do. We hope we can do something like this again!" ■

BEATBOXING 101

On Thursday 25th May, Year 7 music students participated in a beatboxing workshop led by musician and beatboxer, Conrad Murray. The workshop was organised by the Royal College of Music.

Conrad began the workshop by introducing students to the basics of beatboxing. He explained that beatboxing is a form of vocal percussion that uses the mouth, lips, tongue, and throat to create a variety of sounds, including drums, bass lines, and melodies. He then led students in a series of exercises to help them develop their beatboxing skills.

As students became more comfortable with the basics, Conrad challenged them to create their own beats and rhythms. He also showed them how to use beatboxing to accompany other instruments, such

as the guitar and piano. By the end of the workshop, students had learned a variety of beatboxing techniques and were able to create their own original beats.

Having to cancel Sports Day last summer due to the extreme heatwave, HA was determined to ensure the forecast rain would not stop this day from happening.

Imperial College's Dangoor Reach Out Makerspace. The displays really caught the attention of students, offering interaction with cutting-edge technology.

Year 12 University Trips & Future Planning Week

At the end of May we took 35 Year 12 students on a coach to the University of Sussex. With its beautiful green campus and location, Sussex provides an interesting contrast with the city-based, London universities our students may be more familiar with, as well as being a well-regarded academic institution. Our students asked lots of questions of the helpful student ambassadors and returned with a wider understanding of subject choice, applications and student life.

Just two weeks later, as part of our Year 12 Future Planning Week, we needed a much bigger coach to take 71 students to the UCAS University Fair at the University of East London's Docklands campus. Students were able to speak to a range of universities and apprenticeship providers about the courses on offer.

After a frenetic hour and a half, students returned laden with prospectuses and free merchandise. The UCAS Fair is a vital part of our students' university application preparation. Alongside their other Future Planning Week activities, which included personal statement workshops, mock corporate interviews and a parents evening event for all students, the trip prepared them to hit the ground running in September, ready to make important decisions about their next steps.

Year 9 & Year 10 IntoUniversity Collaboration

The Academy has a long-standing partnership with IntoUniversity, a charity that runs workshops for students from disadvantaged backgrounds, with the long-term aim of encouraging them to have the confidence to apply for university study. One of the real strengths of the

partnership is that IntoUniversity work with the same cohort of 30 students throughout their time at the Academy, allowing for real consistency.

This academic year, IntoUniversity has worked with a total of 218 Hammersmith Academy students, from Year 7 to Year 13. As well as the regular in-school workshops, this year our Year 9 and 10 students have also had the chance to attend exciting trips organised in partnership with IntoUniversity. Year 10 attended a one-day trip to Inflexion, a multinational private equity company, where they took part in a team challenge designed to test leadership, teamwork and ability to work under pressure. A Year 10 student said "the best part of the day was getting to know the volunteers, because they could explain their roles in depth". Meanwhile in April, Year 9 took part in a three-day programme, culminating in a visit to the IP Group plc, an intellectual property company, where all the students presented to a panel including company executives.

Year 7 Career Conference

In June, Year 7 students were off timetable for their annual Careers Conference, an opportunity to hear from young workers in their early career about the steps they had taken to get to where they are, what they did and didn't like about their jobs and more. The exciting part was that all speakers had attended Hammersmith Academy, just like them!

Ex-HA students, Chandler Pierre, Senior Researcher at Ridley Scott Films; Anis Uddin, Physician Associate Student at Northwick Park Hospital; Hamza El-Bakkali, Business Consultant at IBM, Samia Hoque, Degree Apprentice at Accenture; and Ayat Saeed, Operation & Integrity Specialist for Snap Inc, had all kindly agreed to give up their time to talk to Year 7s. This proved to be a fantastic opportunity for Year 7 to start focusing on their futures and our ex-students' stories were a great way for them to find motivation and inspiration from some brilliant role models.

WILD SCIENCE



On Friday 19th May, Holly Bestley from the Zoological Society of London (ZSL) delivered a one-hour science speaker talk to Year 12 Biologist students. The talk, "The Work of ZSL and the Zoos: Conservation, Climate Change, and Careers," presented the latest topics in conservation and climate change, as well as the many career opportunities available in the field of wildlife conservation.

The talk began with an overview of ZSL, a global conservation charity that works to protect wildlife and wild places. Holly then discussed the work of ZSL's zoos, which are home to over 6,000 animals from around the world. Holly explained that the zoos use their animals to educate the public about conservation, as well as to conduct research that can be used to help protect wildlife in the wild.

A discussion on the latest topics in conservation followed, including climate change and the illegal wildlife trade. Climate change is a major threat to wildlife, as it is causing the loss of habitats and the spread of diseases. Holly also discussed the illegal wildlife trade, which is a multibillion dollar industry that is driving many species to extinction.

Holly encouraged the students to consider a career in conservation, explaining that there are many different ways to get involved in conservation, including working in zoos, research, education, and policy.

Athletics. ■

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
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
